The Hunt for Green October

What if you were told there wasn't going to be a "Commitment Weekend" this year? No series of cleverly packaged sermons on stewardship culminating in a financial appeal in support of next year's annual budget. Would the tightness in your chest ease a bit? Would you be less apt to flinch when a church staff member tapped you on the shoulder during the month of October?

If you've been around MCC for a few years, then you've likely experienced "The Hunt for Green October." You've participated in a budget planning and approval process, a push for year-end contributions to cover this year's ministry costs, and a stewardship campaign to underwrite next year's budget. None of which you looked forward to, but only endured to get to the good stuff, Christmas.

But Jesus says there's a life out there beyond the pledge. An adventurous life of discipleship that leads to something greater. A Kingdom-sized LIFE that supersedes the small, self-minded life we all chase. The problem with a "Hunt for Green October" approach to stewardship is that it doesn't lead us to find that better life that Jesus talks about. It's based on a life of management, rather than faith. It's focused on meeting needs, rather than the shape of our discipleship.

What is the Hebrews 10:34 Offering?

The Hebrews 10:34 is a special offering that will be received on the weekend of January 8/9 of 2011. The offering is a special gift that is above and beyond what we normally give to support the mission of our church. It's a sacrificial offering that will be used to bless people through the mission of Middletown Christian Church. We are asking people to prepare the offering by making some lifestyle changes, such as doing Christmas differently this year. This is not a fundraiser for any particular project, or our annual stewardship campaign. What we will experience spiritually is just as important as how it will be used. Our prayer is that this experience will be a catalyst for our spiritual growth and commitment to be the Kingdom of God. We are sharing the news about the special offering now to help you prepare for it.

A Life of Discipleship

That's why this year is going to be different. Not because we are lowering the bar on giving. In fact, we are raising it. We are on a spiritual journey to transform the heart of our congregation. We are committed to becoming true disciples of Jesus.

And following Jesus is so much more than fundraising. A life of discipleship is following Jesus by doing what he did. It calls for living the kind of radically generous life that Jesus expects us to live. So why should we expect anything different from ourselves at church? As his disciples, Jesus expects us to be generous all the time. Answering the call to "Be the Kingdom Now" means living a generous life at all times, in all respects.

Doing What They Did

Jesus doesn't call us to ponder our generosity once a year in October. We are expected to be generous all year long because amazing, transformative, redemptive things happen in the world when we make sacrifices for compassion's sake. It's a way of life that Jesus lived; it's what he died for. In fact, Jesus promises that this way of life is the key to unlocking a LIFE of real joy and blessing.

The early church caught hold of this LIFE by being dangerously generous and in the process discovered something better and more lasting. And the only way we can experience that LIFE—that something greater—is to do what they did.

Some suggestions for the offering.

1. Discuss with your family about the offering and make it a shared experience.
2. Use it to do Christmas differently this year and to deepen your Christmas experience.
3. Think of other lifestyle sacrifices that you could make to prepare for the offering.
4. Pray about your 10:34 offering. Pray with your family. Pray that the Holy Spirit will continue to move among us. Pray that God will reveal his plans to us. Pray that we may see and experience the glory of God that will be revealed when we make life-changing sacrifices. Pray that he will show us the first simple steps we need to take.

A Hebrews 10:34 Experience

"For you had compassion for those who were in prison, and you cheerfully accepted the plundering of your possessions, knowing that you yourselves possessed something better and more lasting." (Hebrews 10:34)

Hebrews 10:34 tells the inspirational story of a community of Christians who were experiencing extreme persecution. They were beaten, their property was seized, and they were thrown into prison. Those who were not thrown into prison were forced to make a difficult decision. Do they go underground and disappear, or do they support their fellow Christians and experience the same level of abuse? In verse 34 we get the answer, *"For you had compassion for those who were in prison, and you cheerfully accepted the plundering of your possessions."* I believe Hebrews was written to produce these kind of Christians, people who love sacrificially to bring the love of God to the world. They knew that they would suffer abuse, they would lose their property, their possessions would be plundered; but they chose the path of dangerous love anyway. The result was that the Good News of Jesus Christ spread rapidly in spite of their difficult circumstances.

What would happen if we became a Hebrews 10:34 Church? I believe there would be an avalanche of mercy and mission like we've not seen before. Our lives would be transformed in ways that we never dreamed possible and the lives of hurting and wounded people would be transformed before our very eyes. The love that would pour out of us and through us to the world would bring large numbers of people to Jesus Christ. We would not just be talking about feeding 130 children every weekend. We'd be talking about feeding 1000 children. We would not just be sending a construction team to Honduras, we'd be building an orphanage and funding a month's worth of operations. We would not have to ask people to return a pledge card annually because our offerings would exceed anything we ever imagined. And our church debt would be eliminated in a heartbeat. Better yet, we'd be vaulted into a new realm of Christian living and joy that is only accessible to people who live in this way.

I can't speak for you. But I want what they had. I want what the early Christians in Hebrews experienced. I want to know Christ in that way for myself. I want to belong to that kind of church. And I'm not the only one. That is why every member of your church staff, and your entire church board has been talking with each other and with their families about what it would mean to become that kind of Christian and that kind of church. After much prayer about this we have unanimously decided to make a radical sacrificial offering that will require us to live differently. We are going to make some sacrifices in our lifestyle in order

to bring a special 10:34 offering to worship on the 2nd Sunday in January. Some of us are going to create a 10:34 jar and then find some creative ways to fill it. Some ideas that I've heard include cutting off cable TV for 3 months, skipping a couple of lunches each week, giving the money we have saved from doing weddings or from playing gigs in a band, and so on. Others have made the decision to cut their Christmas budget in half and then putting it in the jar. Whatever it is, it has to be something that requires us to live differently.

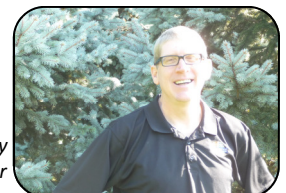
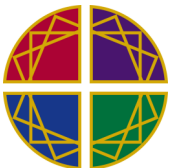
Of course, one offering will not change everything. We are trying to create an experience that will move us one step down the road toward becoming a 10:34 church and becoming fully committed Disciples of Jesus.

We are inviting you to join us to take a step toward becoming a 10:34 Christian. Think about the wonderful opportunity this gives you to have some great conversations with your children about the real meaning of Christmas. Think about what you will be able to teach them about generosity as they see you practice it. Think about what it will be like for us all to show up on the 2nd weekend of January with an offering that required great sacrifices. Think about what could happen if just 400 families agreed to cut Christmas in half and make a special gift to bless people through the mission of our church. We would then know what they had was greater and more lasting than the the stuff they lost. Think how we could bless our community with that kind of offering. Now more than ever our world needs a church like that. Now more than ever we need a faith like that.

Life At The Valley

There's power in a whisper from God. Have you heard God whispering lately? I have. God's been whispering in my ear the past few months... "There is more to do. Your work is just beginning." As I have prayed about and pondered that reality I realize God wasn't just talking to me, he was talking to us as a church, especially to those of us who call The Valley home. I had a full relationship with the church and only a passing relationship with Jesus. I even remember a time when I was eager to talk with people about the church but felt uncomfortable saying the name of Jesus. I was uncomfortable because my relationship with the church was stronger than my relationship with Jesus. I knew the church better than I knew Jesus. I had it backwards. For several years I have been working to correct this problem. My relationship with Jesus has become more than just words, traditions, and Sunday mornings. I see the church much differently because I have committed myself to Jesus instead of the church.

When our relationships with Jesus and the church are in proper order our faith grows deeper and our church

grows stronger. The church is the vehicle we use to take the Good News into the world and it is the vehicle that brings us into a deeper relationship with God. We have obstacles that must be overcome. Fulfilling God's purpose for this church will require us to be less committed to the institution of the church and deepen our relationship with Jesus and tap into the power of the Holy Spirit.

Where are you? Are you a part-time follower of Jesus? Our campus will never become the ministry God calls us to be if our pews are filled with part-time followers of Jesus. Make Jesus full-time in your life no matter whether you are full or part time worker, retired, unemployed, or a student. It will change your life and this church. The first step is to make Jesus a full-time part of your life.

Through her leadership, we will offer support and service to those in grief.

We need compassionate and loving people to join this ministry. You do not have to be perfect to care for others. All that is required is the love that you experience through Christ and can extend to our community of faith. Please contact me or Sherry White to join this ministry.

Healing Through a Community of Care

Two things brought me to the Grief Workshop for the first time. One was listening to David's sermons when he challenged us to be better servants, better disciples. I wrestled with that for some time. The other was a life altering event that occurred over thirty years ago. My seven year old daughter, Laurie, died from an inoperable, malignant brain tumor.

When Laurie died, I didn't know anyone who had lost a child, and very few who had lost a parent, spouse or any other member of their immediate family. I didn't know what to expect. What happens to your mind and body after such a devastating loss? How would others behave toward me? What would my other children need? After her death, I was unable to concentrate on or comprehend anything. I'd be at the grocery checkout or driving and suddenly be in tears. There were times I thought I was losing my mind.

In the years since Laurie's death, I have felt a great need to use that experience in a positive way. I

believed this would help me accept the reality of Laurie's death. When I read about the recent Grief Workshop, I thought that maybe this was the opportunity I was looking for.

When I went to the first meeting of the Grief Workshop, I met people who were grieving over a fairly recent loss of a spouse, parent, or a time of lost opportunities in life. I was humbled by their stories and tears. I was able to share my story and this brought my loss of Laurie, and those in my life who died after her, to life again.

I wanted those in the group to see that I still had the sorrow and pain, but I was able to go on. While I don't believe you ever get over such losses, I feel that you can learn to live with them. The loss becomes part of who you are, but it doesn't have to be all that you are. I wanted my friends to see that someone like me, someone who had no formal knowledge of the grieving process, had made it. I had had "on the job training" and I had survived—to me, that was a miracle. I wanted them to know that even as great as their pain and sense of loss was they could survive too.

Despite what it felt like at times, they weren't losing their minds and it was okay to cry in the aisle at Kroger.

Not only would they survive, but they would again find joy, hope, laughter, and some measure of peace. Their world would never be the same, but God would walk with them through the dark periods as He did with me. He would lift them up when they felt they couldn't or didn't want to go on. When the pain was so intense that their heart actually ached, He would sustain them. God would give them the strength and courage to face another hour, another day, and ultimately all the days ahead.

The Grief Workshop has helped me to renew my peace as a grieving mother and gave me the opportunity, hopefully, to bring a little comfort to others who have suffered a loss. What a blessing it has been for me!

Kingdom Now in Honduras!

As a youth minister for 21 years I had the privilege and pleasure of planning many mission trips within the U.S. and in Central America. Now I was a part of a team from MCC headed to Honduras. My whole approach to this experience had to be different. I told myself, "Just give yourself to the experience and BE." As a result, I met wonderful people, made new and lasting friendships, discovered a country of beauty and harmony and experienced **Kingdom Now** at Hospital Loma de Luz.

Hospital Loma de Luz sits on the side of a mountain in Northeastern Honduras along the Caribbean coast. It's name means "a light on a hill", and it provides healing, hope and Christ to everyone it can. Since coming to MCC I had always heard about this hospital and the care it provided. I was looking forward to seeing this place in action and I was not disappointed. People come from across the road, across mountains, from cities and villages to be treated there. No one is turned away and no case is too severe for the staff to address. The doctors, nurses, and so many others have given up life in other places to be here full time. Their devotion to their work and the Honduran people is amazing. But what I discovered is that Loma de Luz is so much more! **Loma de Luz is also...**

A Launching Point - every person on staff is engaged in some sort of ministry outside of their regular work at the hospital. These ministries include leading small groups, being part of ministry teams in village churches, running a food ministry at a local dump, teaching mountain school children or missionary children.

An Orphanage - that provides love and care for children no one else wants. Some of these children have been abused, abandoned, or malnourished. Many have special needs physically and mentally. These children are given everything they need, especially LOVE! The staff meets every need with enthusiasm and patience. The children are fed, clothed, accepted as part of a family, and looked after in every way imaginable. Their lives would be miserable or maybe even non-existent if not for this place.

A 125 acre farm - that provides food for the hospital, jobs for local residents, and teaches people how to raise their own food for their families. Over 1800 African Oil of Palm trees have been planted and will be harvested in two years. Chickens and goats are being raised. Tilapia ponds are being stocked. A greenhouse for vegetables and other plants is being constructed. The possibilities of this ministry are endless.



A Bilingual School - that reaches out to local Honduran children and brings them together with missionary children for education. It is reading, writing, and arithmetic meshed with the Gospel that provides a wonderful experience for children to come together and learn.

A place I visited for a week - doing simple work, but work they couldn't afford to do, and work that was always less important than something else. It was necessary work that made the hospital a more welcoming and comfortable place. If I had not gone to clean, sand, prime and paint doors & door frames, I would not have been able to tell you about everything that is happening there.

It was important work because it gave 10 people a chance to see God happening in different ways in a different place.

Loma de Luz is a growing, ever-changing ministry and outreach that does so much in so many different ways. It is Jesus personified in the northeastern jungle of Honduras. It is God's love shared and received every minute of every day. It is KINGDOM NOW and I feel blessed to have been able to experience a week there helping out. I can't wait to return and possibly take you there with me!

Meet Monica Lewis



Over the last year we have been working to establish a relationship with Louisville Presbyterian Theological Seminary (LPTS) and their field education department for Middletown Christian Church to be a regular placement site for students taking the “Practical Theology in Congregations” (PTC) course. This is a

relationship that benefits the seminary, the student, as well as Middletown Christian Church. At MCC we look forward to providing a promising seminary student with a context for theological reflection and praxis across a variety of parish-based ministry settings. This is a stipend position for each academic year (Fall and Spring semesters) calling for 15 hours of practical ministry experience each week.

For the 2010-2011 academic year, we are fortunate to welcome Monica Lewis as our LPTS seminary intern. Monica is working on her Masters of Divinity and Disciples of Christ ordination track at LPTS. She and her husband, Johnny joined MCC a little over a year ago after discovering the Disciples together (previously Baptist) and relocating to Louisville for work and school. Shortly after joining MCC Johnny was called to serve Pleasureville Christian Church, Pleasureville, KY. He is a recognized Disciples minister with the denomination and

together Monica and Johnny will be “living into” all the experiences and dynamics of being a clergy couple.

In coordination with her Fall class schedule Monica will hold office hours on Monday and Thursday afternoons from 1:00 to 5:00 p.m. In addition to these office hours, Monica will have weekly flex hours to meet with individual staff, ministry teams, and attend to defined ministry accountabilities as well as weekend responsibilities. Again, we are working to provide seminary interns with a variety of pastoral experiences, so Monica’s specific responsibilities and assignments will vary across the year in coordination with division leaders.
